













Citizen Engagement in Parliamentary Democratic Practices during Wartime: Ukraine's Experience Parliaments have a vital role as democratic institutions in addressing society's challenges. Engaging citizens, including youngsters, in decision-making is essential to building public trust, increasing the legitimacy of decisions, and achieving participatory, inclusive, and responsive governance.

An engaged, well-educated citizen is at the heart of strong democratic societies. Civic education is needed for younger generations to build civic competencies, which will ensure their growth as responsible citizens. Creating an environment in which youth feel their voice counts is crucial.

It is especially important today when Ukrainians are fighting for an independent democratic future. What's more, war brings incredible challenges for parliamentary work, civil society, and democracy. Russia systematically deports Ukrainian children from the occupied territories, destroys educational infrastructure, forces Ukrainian students to study in shelters, etc., and Ukrainian civilians, including children, often are victims of Russian missile attacks.

However, even in the face of a brutal, unprovoked Russian war, Ukrainians continue to develop their democracy. Here are just a few examples of institutions and activities that, with USAID "RADA: Next Generation" Program's support, increase the engagement of citizens and youth in the policy and decision-making processes in Ukraine.

Education Center of the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine

The Parliamentary Education Center (PEC) conducts various lessons and interactive events in order to:

- raise public awareness of VRU's activity, functions, and role in the system of state bodies;
- thus, promote Parliament's openness, intensify interaction with citizens, and strengthen public trust.

Since Russia's full-scale invasion, the PEC has been adapting its work to wartime conditions. Its staff:

- established an unprecedented mixed (online and offline; for citizens in Ukraine and abroad) work mode;
- ensured continuous communication with citizens and education without borders:
- introduced field lessons in Ukraine's regions;
- developed international partnerships and diplomacy.

As a result, the number of events and participants dramatically increased. During the two years of the full-scale invasion, the PEC organized more than 300 events, with over 150,000 participants. The main audience is pupils and students, including children with disabilities.

Parliamentary Internships for the youth

The Parliamentary Internship Program for Ukraine was founded in 1995. Since that time, over 2100 graduates in 27 cohorts have successfully completed the Program. The Program serves as a professional elevator for youth: among its alumni are 9 MPs from different convocations, as well as ministers, heads of state bodies, diplomats, etc. About 7% of alumni serve as the staffers of the Secretariat of the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine. During martial law, the Program's activities are suspended.

However, in 2023, the USAID "RADA: Next Generation" Program organized a youth internship at the Research Service of Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine to strengthen its institutional and expert capacity, create opportunities for young people to bring their voices to government bodies, and help them influence policy-making.

Network of parliamentary civic education centers

Schools remain the main place of education for Ukrainian children in wartime. When democracy is under attack, it is crucial to create a space where children can form their civic competencies for future public engagement in decision-making and influencing state policy.

To promote parliamentary civic education, a network of parliamentary civic education centers has been established in 43 schools and out-of-school education institutions in 14 Ukrainian regions with the support of USAID "RADA: Next Generation" Program and partner Agency for Educational Policy Development. An educational program and methodological recommendations for the course "Our Parliament: Explore, Understand, Influence" are already being tested in the network of parliamentary civic education centers.

An all-Ukrainian simulation game, "Y18: We are lawmakers!" was also launched for high school students. During the game, the students imitate the work of the VRU Committees and elaborate draft laws to solve social problems.

In such a way, Ukrainian youth can learn in practice how the parliament works as well as its role in state policy formation.

Civil Society Engagement

To respond to wartime challenges and needs, USAID "RADA Next Generation" Program launched the "Citizens and Parliament: Democratic Representation and Effective Interaction in the Wartime" Grant Initiative for civil society organizations (CSOs).

Within this Grant Initiative, CSOs:

- held public consultations on important public issues and legislation, engaging a wide range of stakeholders and MPs;
- trained civic activists to interact with the authorities and MPs of Ukraine;
- studied the needs of voters under martial law and presented the results to lawmakers;
- worked with voters to engage them in decision-making and develop legislative proposals;
- communicated reforms and legislative changes in the context of war and Ukraine's European integration.
